## Attendance Policy



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## 1. Aims

At Houstone School, we are committed to meeting our obligations with regards to school attendance by:
> Promoting good attendance and reducing absence, including persistent absence
> Ensuring every pupil has access to full-time education to which they are entitled >
Acting early to address patterns of absence
We will also support parents to perform their legal duty to ensure their children of compulsory school age attend regularly, and will promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

## 2. Legislation and guidance

This policy meets the requirements of the school attendance guidance from the Department for Education (DfE), and refers to the DfE's statutory guidance on school attendance parental responsibility measures. These documents are drawn from the following legislation setting out the legal powers and duties that govern school attendance:
$>$ Part 6 of The Education Act 1996
$>$ Part 3 of The Education Act 2002
$>$ Part 7 of The Education and Inspections Act 2006
$>$ The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006 (and 2010, 2011, 2013, 2016 amendments)

The Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013
This policy also refers to the DfE's guidance on the school census, which explains the persistent absence threshold.

## 3. Roles and responsibilities

### 3.1 The governing board

The governing board is responsible for monitoring attendance figures for the whole school on at least a termly basis. It also holds the Principal to account for the implementation of this policy.

### 3.2 The Principal

The Principal is responsible for:
Implementation of this policy at the school
> Monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors
> Supporting staff with monitoring the attendance of individual pupils >
Issuing fixed-penalty notices, where necessary

### 3.3 The attendance officer

The school attendance officer:
> Monitors attendance data across the school and at an individual pupil level
> Reports concerns about attendance to the Principal
> Works with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence
Arranges calls and meetings with parents to discuss attendance issues
> Advises the Principal when to issue fixed-penalty notices

### 3.4 Form Tutors

Form Tutors are responsible for recording attendance on a daily basis, using the correct codes, and submitting this information to the school office.

### 3.5 School Office staff

School office staff are expected to take calls from parents about absence and record it on the school system.

## 4. Recording attendance

### 4.1 Attendance register

We will keep an attendance register, and place all pupils onto this register.
We will take our attendance register at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark whether every pupil is:

- Present
- Attending an approved off-site educational activity
- Absent
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances Any amendment to the attendance register will include:
- The original entry
- The amended entry
- The reason for the amendment
- The date on which the amendment was made
- The name and position of the person who made the amendment See appendix 1 for the DfE attendance codes.

We will keep every entry on the attendance register for 3 years after the date on which the entry was made.
Pupils must arrive in school by 08:25AM on each school day.
The register for the first session will be taken at 08:30AM and will be kept open until 08:50AM. The register for the second session will be taken at 13:40PM and will be kept open until 13:45PM.

### 4.2 Unplanned absence

The pupil's parent/carer must notify the school on the first day of an unplanned absence 08:00AM or as soon as practically possible (see also section 7).
Notification Procedure:

- Parents/Carers should call the main school number and select the 'Report an Absence' option.
- The message should include the child's full name, tutor group and reason for absence.
- Parents/Carers should notify Houstone School on the first day of absence and any additional days of absence thereafter.

We will mark absence due to illness as authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness. If the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask the pupil's parent/carer to provide medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised and parents/carers will be notified of this in advance.

### 4.3 Planned absence

We encourage parents/carers to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary. Attending a medical or dental appointment will be counted as authorised as long as the pupil's parent/carer notifies the school in advance of the appointment.

To notify the school of any absence in this area, please call the main school office or email info@houstoneschool.co.uk at least 48 hours in advance where possible.

The pupil's parent/carer must also apply for other types of term-time absence as far in advance as possible of the requested absence. Go to section 5 to find out which term-time absences the school can authorise.

### 4.4 Lateness and punctuality

A pupil who arrives late:
>Before the register has closed will be marked as late, using the appropriate code
>After the register has closed will be marked as absent, using the appropriate code
A pupil who accumulates more than 1 late mark in a week or more than 5 late marks across a half-term will require a parent meeting to agree steps to reduce this problem.

### 4.5 Following up absence

Where any child we expect to attend school does not attend, or stops attending, the school will:
> Follow up on their absence with their parent/carer to ascertain the reason, by calling every contact on the pupil record in order.
$>$ Ensure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary
> Identify whether the absence is approved or not >
Identify the correct attendance code to use

### 4.6 Reporting to parents

Every pupil's attendance (attendance to school and punctuality) will be included on a written report sent home with progress reports (twice per academic year).

## 5. Authorised and unauthorised absence

### 5.1 Approval for term-time absence

The Principal will only grant a leave of absence to pupils during term time if they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'. A leave of absence is granted at the Principal 's discretion.

The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specific facts, circumstances and relevant context behind the request.

Valid reasons for authorised absence include:
$>$ Illness and medical/dental appointments (see sections 4.2 and 4.3 for more detail)
$>$ Religious observance - where the day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parents belong. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents' religious body to confirm whether the day is set apart
> Traveller pupils travelling for occupational purposes - this covers Roma, English and Welsh Gypsies, Irish and Scottish Travellers, Showmen (fairground people) and Circus people, Bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and New Travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a Traveller family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision

### 5.2 Reducing persistent absence

Houstone School will work to tackle persistent absence by:

- Monitoring and reporting absence to parents
- Using Parental meetings and reports
- Liaising with the Local Authority and Children's' Services
- Requesting Support from the Education Welfare Officer
- Using legal sanctions


### 5.3 Legal sanctions

The school or local authority can fine parents for the unauthorised absence of their child from school, where the child is of compulsory school age.

If issued with a fine, or penalty notice, each parent must pay $£ 60$ within 21 days or $£ 120$ within 28 days. The payment must be made directly to the local authority.

Penalty notices can be issued by a Principal , local authority officer or the police.
The decision on whether or not to issue a penalty notice may take into account:
$>$ The number of unauthorised absences occurring within a rolling academic year
> One-off instances of irregular attendance, such as holidays taken in term time without permission
$>$ Where an excluded pupil is found in a public place during school hours without a justifiable reason
If the payment has not been made after 28 days, the local authority can decide whether to prosecute or withdraw the notice.

## 6. Promoting attendance

> At Houstone School we will use clear and consistently applied systems and processes to improve, reward and incentivise attendance and address absences. We make sure these systems are inclusive and appropriate for all pupils.

## 7. Attendance monitoring

The attendance officer at our school monitors pupil absence on a daily basis.
A pupil's parent/carer is expected to call the school in the morning if their child is going to be absent due to ill health (see section 4.2 ) and on any subsequent days of absence.

If a pupil's absence goes above 3 days, the school will contact the parent/carer of the pupil to discuss the reasons for this.

If a pupil's absence continue to rise after contacting their parent/carer, we will consider involving an education welfare officer.
The persistent absence threshold is $10 \%$. If a pupil's individual overall absence rate is greater than or equal to $10 \%$, the pupil will be classified as a persistent absentee.
Pupil-level absence data will be collected each term and published at national and local authority level through the DfE's school absence national statistics releases. The underlying school-level absence data is published alongside the national statistics. The school will compare attendance data to the national average, and share this with the governing board.

Houstone School uses SIMS to record and monitor attendance data. It is used to:
Track the attendance of individual pupils
> Identify whether or not there are particular groups of children whose absences may be a cause for concern
$>$ Monitor and evaluate those children identified as being in need of intervention and support

## 8. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed as guidance from the local authority or DfE is updated, and as a minimum annually by the Principal.

## Appendix 1: attendance codes

The following codes are taken from the DfE's guidance on school attendance.

## Appendix 2: First Day Absence Calling Protocol

The process is as follows:

1. After registers are taken and absence calls are noted we produce the list of children absent with no explanation
2. We double check in school before we start calling.
3. We call everyone on the contact list until you get an answer. We leave messages if there is a voicemail option.
4. Once you make contact, stop this 'first day calling' process.
5. We call the contact list at least twice.
6. If no reply at all, from anyone on the contact list for the child we consider:

- Does the child have additional agency support, such as a social worker, contact them.
- Do you have any in school intelligence, does anyone know the family.

7. The DSL and Principal are notified.
8. We make a prompt home visit.
9. If we cannot get an answer we refer immediately to children's services / MASH / Police - request a welfare call. These procedures are in line with borough guidance and our attendance policy.
